The Future of All Nations Christian College

Is All Nations closing?

No. All Nations is stepping into an exciting new chapter. We are proposing to move our primary UK teaching location from Easneye to Chester House in Muswell Hill, London. This move allows us to expand our global reach and change the way Christians around the world are equipped for mission.

Why are you leaving the Easneye campus?

Easneye has been a beautiful and historic home for the college, but our vision requires us to look forward. Maintaining a large, single estate requires significant resources. To exercise good biblical stewardship, we are releasing the funds tied up in the property so we can invest directly in our core mission: equipping the global church and making our training more accessible worldwide.

Is this a permanent move or a trial?

The proposed move to Muswell Hill is our strategic first step beyond the Easneye campus. As we look to the future, our aim is to become highly flexible, establishing teaching hubs and partnerships wherever we are most needed globally, rather than relying on one permanent traditional campus.

Is the college going fully online, or will there still be in-person learning?

We are committed to continuing in-person training. While we successfully teach online, we believe that in-person, cross-cultural community living is vital for personal and spiritual formation. Chester House is proposed to serve as our next in-person UK hub.

How can you deliver in-person community learning without a traditional campus?

Many of our programmes outside the UK already operate successfully without a traditional campus. Moving forward, we are partnering with existing communities, like Chester House, and global partners to facilitate intercultural learning in real-world contexts.

What will happen to the All Nations library?

We are proud to host the largest mission library in Europe, and we will continue to steward this incredible global resource. We plan to take our core academic texts with us to Muswell Hill, while the remainder of the collection will go into secure temporary storage as we develop our long-term library strategy.

Can I still apply to study at All Nations?

Yes! Applications for our MA, final year BA, and our popular 10-week En Route programme (which runs three times a year) are all open. We are also planning to launch new short courses and study options for 2026-27, so please keep an eye on our website: www.allnations.ac.uk/courses
