

LEVEL 5 DIRECT ENTRY: PRE-READING

Welcome to All Nations! We look forward to meeting you.

Because of your prior learning and cross-cultural experience, you will be entering the Undergraduate Programme at Level 5, the second year of the 2-year Diploma course and the 3-year degree course.

As a direct entrant to Level 5, you will be taking the Foundation Course, which starts a few weeks before the main programme. This course is intended to strengthen the foundations for the rest of your studies by covering some of the key content from Level 4, which we will build on at Level 5 and Level 6. It will also help you to develop your own self-awareness and understanding as a learner in a cross-cultural community.

The Foundation Course includes some essential pre-work before term begins, and some additional classes during term 1 and term 2. You will be given login details to access the essential pre-work during the summer vacation, and a detailed timetable of your additional classes will be provided shortly before the start of term.

This document details some additional pre-reading which will help you to prepare, supplementing the Foundation Course. This is optional, but highly recommended.

If you are able to read more of the New Testament than this, or read a whole introduction to the New Testament, then this will help you, but the focus of your New Testament classes at Level 5 will be on the gospels and Acts.
